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Month day: the date on the Letter of Intent, Letter of Pend and Discussion, or Letter of Intent to Protect. The Trimaris March letter had no date, so the postmark date of March 30 is being used.

(Month day): for administrative reasons, this LoI has not yet been scheduled.

Jan: Pelican and Wreath are both having two-day meetings due to the number of items to process.

Not all letters of intent may be considered when they are originally scheduled on this cover letter. The date of mailing of the LoI, date of receipt of the Laurel packet, or other factors may delay consideration of certain letters of intent. Additionally, some letters of intent received may not have been scheduled because the administrative requirements (receipt of the forms packet, receipt of the necessary fees, et cetera) have not yet been met.

REMINDER: Until all administrative requirements are met, the letter may not be scheduled.

From Laurel: Clarification of the Grandfather Clause

This month we had several submissions that wished to use the "Grandfather Clause" when submitting a new name. From these submissions it is evident there is confusion about what the clause is and how to use it.

The "Grandfather Clause" refers to section II.5 of the Rules for Submission. For the full text I refer you to the Rules for Submission. In 1995 the clause was extended to include immediate family in the precedent:

[W]e allow the original submitter to register further instances of the problematic element <u>provided that they introduce no new violations of the rules</u>; and secondly, we extend the allowance to the original submitter's nearest kin. [Roxanne Blackfeather, East-R, LoAR December 1995, p. 20]

The clause also allows for family to use the same name element. I know that many consider some relationships inside the SCA to be family, but in this context, "nearest kin" is real-world family only.

Support for use of the "Grandfather Clause" by family members must be included with the submission. Such support may be a letter signed by the family member with the original registration indicating the family relations, or it may be other documentation such as a birth certificate.

From Laurel: Additions to Appendix D, Suggested Standard Form Letters

The following sample letters are being added to help submitters and their local heralds provide the required information when submitting items for registration that include either the use of the "Grandfather Clause" (Rules for Submission II.5) or a transfer of a registered item. These suggested letter formats are additions to those currently defined in Appendix D of the Administrative Handbook of the College of Arms.

Documentation of Legal Relationship for Grandfather Clause

I, [Legal name], known in the SCA as [Society name], attest that [Legal name of submitter], known in the SCA as [Society name of submitter], is my legal [father / mother / wife / husband / son / daughter / brother / sister]. I understand that this letter cannot be withdrawn once [Legal name of submitter]'s name is registered.

A transfer of a name or item of armory requires both a letter of transfer from the owner and a letter of acceptance of transfer from the recipient.

Letter of Transfer of Name

I, [Legal name], known in the SCA as [Society name], transfer to [Name of submitter], known in the SCA as [Society name of submitter], the [household/personal] name "[Registered name]". I understand that this transfer cannot be withdrawn once made.

Letter of Acceptance of Transfer of Name *

Letter of Transfer of Armory *

I, [Legal name], known in the SCA as [Society name], transfer to [Legal name of submitter], known in the SCA as [Society name of submitter], the armory "[Blazon of registered armory]". I understand that this transfer cannot be withdrawn once made.

Letter of Acceptance of Transfer of Armory *

I, [Legal name], known in the SCA as [Society name], accept the transfer from [Legal name of submitter], known in the SCA as [Society name of submitter], the armory "[Blazon of registered armory]". I understand that this transfer cannot be withdrawn once made.

From Pelican: Conway's Celtic Book of Names - A Source to be Avoided

A submission this month documented a given name from D. J. Conway, The Celtic Book of Names. Siren provided an evaluation of this source:

The entire name is: "The Celtic Book of Names: Traditional Names from Ireland, Scotland, and Wales" [...].

There are sample pages at www.amazon.com. The first page mixes Anglicized forms (Aideen), Gaelic forms (Ailbhe), and Latinized forms (Affrica) as header forms without notation. The names listed include human names used in period, names which were adopted more recently, deity names, bynames, and just words. There is little attempt to distinguish when names came into use, what spellings might be appropriate for period, or when names fell out of use.

Given these problems with this source, it is not useful for our purposes and should be avoided.

From Pelican: Regarding Capitalization in Norse Bynames

In the Cover Leter to the April 2002 LoAR, I called for comments regarding the requirement that descriptive bynames in Old Norse be written in lowercase.

When registering transliteration of non-Roman alphabets (including Norse runes), we register the name using modern transliterations standards. We will also register period transliteration standards where such exist. In the case of Old Norse, there are period manuscripts of sagas and other works that are rendered using the Roman alphabet. From these, we can determine that the period standard was to transliterate descriptive bynames in lowercase. (See the cover letter for the April 2002 LoAR for more information.) The modern transliteration standard, both in Europe and the U.S., is to transliterate descriptive bynames in lowercase.

It is important to remember that <u>transliteration</u> is different than <u>translation</u>. Mass-market modern English <u>translations</u> of Old Norse sagas show a wide variety of levels of scholarship. In general, these translate Old Norse names using modern English naming standards - and so capitalize bynames. But these are translations and so are not relevant to the current issue under discussion.

Gold Phoenix provided examples from E.V. Gordon's An Introduction to Old Norse and describes this work for those not familiar with Old Norse resources:

The work in question is one of the standard texts in the study of the Old Norse language. It was first published in 1927 by the University of Oxford. After several reprints, a revised edition was edited by A.R. Taylor in 1957. This edition was corrected at its second printing in 1962, and subsequently reprinted at least seven times, including the 1983 printing that is in my possession. The author and editor appear to have been professors at the University of Leeds at the time of their writing.

An important part of this discussion is whether or not the transliteration standards used by Gordon follow accepted standards. Gunnvör silfrahárr (formerly Gunnora Hallakarva) provided an evaluation of Gordon's work and compared a number of the capitalized bynames found in Gordon to period manuscripts:

(1) Alexandr Paue

Pope Alexander. From a Vita of King Eric the Saint, who ruled 1150-1160. This is a translation into Old Norse from a now-lost Latin Vita. Occurs in a phrase of Latin, "...quinto decimo Kalendas Iunii, i Alexandri Paua..."

(2) Áslákr Hólmskalli

Aslakr the bald of Holm. From the Jómsvíkinga saga, in Heimskringla, authored by Snorri Sturluson. The best text we have of this is ca. 1260, but it was lost in a fire in 1728, and we're now working from paper copies. Other mss. exist, from c. 1325. Going to the normalized Iælandic text at Nætútgáfan (http://www.snerpa.is/net/forn/jomsvik.htm), it has "...en annar heitir Áslákur og er kallaður >>>>Áslákur hólmskalli<

(3) Awair Strabain

Avarr Straw-legs, from Gutasaga, c. 1350. When you go look at a non-normalized text, this appears as *all* lower case:

"Mangir kunungar stridu agutland mithan hathit war. thau hieldu gutar e iemlica sithri Oc ret sinum. Sithan sentu gutar sendumen manga tjl suiarikis En engin thaira fic frith gart fyr than >>>>awair strabain<<>>< af alfha socn hann gierthi fyrsti frith withr suja kunung." http://www.lysator.liu.se/runeberg/gutasaga/04.html or http://spraakdata.gu.se/ktext/Delsingfiler/Mos-KS mfl/Kronikor/CS-txt for instance...

(4) Björn Svíakon ungr

Bjorn Swedes'-king, capitalized because "Swede" and "Sweden" are proper nouns.

(5) Búi Digri

Bui the Stout. From the Jómsvíkinga saga. Going to the normalized Icelandic text at Netútgáfan

(http://www.snerpa.is/net/forn/jomsvik.htm), it has "Og hefir heitið son þeirra Búi er kallaður var >>> Búi hinn digri<<< ..."

(6) Böðvarr Biarki

As Gordon is at pains to point out, "Concerning Böðvarr Bjarki's name, however, it is to be noted that Bjarki is not really the cognomen, as it is taken to be in Hrólfs saga, but is his original name; as he says in the Bjarkamál (in the Latin translation of Saxo): belligeri (=Böðvarr) accepti cognomen. The name in Icelandic would properly be Böðvar-Bjarki, 'battle-Bjarki'." p. 26-27. In other words, this one is [odd] just to start with and shouldn't be relied upon in this particular controversy.

(7) Domnal Selshöfuð

This one is from a runic inscription. Having access to the actual Rundata database

(http://www.nordiska.uu.se/forskn/samnord.html) of all runic inscriptions, this one is from Ireland and is known as "IR 1": < tomnal selshofoth a soerth| |theta >. In normalized Old Norse this would be "Domnal selshöfuð á sverð þetta" or "Domnall seal'shead owns this sword."

(8) Eadmund inn Helgi

St. Edmund, king of England. This is from Islendingabók, aka Libellus Islandorum, written by Ari Þórgilsson, who lived from 1067-1148. The text depends on two 17th century copies of a lost 12th century vellum ms. Gordon says of this, "The copyist, Jón Erlendson, reproduces the spelling of the old manuscript, but in the following selections the spelling has been normalized on the same plan as the other Icelandic texts in this volume." p. 34.

I had a tough time finding a source of the Old Norse text other than Gordon, but finally found the paragraph mentioning Edmund in normalized Icelandic (http://netla.khi.is/greinar/2002/001/005.htm):

"...er Ívar Ragnarsson loðbrókar lét dæpa >>>>Eadmund hinn helga<<<< Englakonung..."

(9) Eiríkr Blóðøx

Erik Blood-axe. This is from Egils saga Skallagrímssonar, which we have from vellum mss. from ca. 1350 and paper mss. from the 17th century, with some fragments from one ms. ca. 1250.

Going to the normalized Icelandic at Netútgáfan (http://www.snerpa.is/net/isl/egils.htm), it is shown as:

"Eiríkur, son Haralds konungs, er kallaður var blóðöx..." (Eric, son of King Harald, who was called blood-axe...)

Just looking at this handful, I believe that Gordon's normalizations don't bear much resemblance to current scholarly usage (nor to what modern Icelanders do with it). Reviewing the Icelandic normalized saga texts at Netútgáfan, I am unable to find any bynames that are capitalized, unless they are (a) prepended bynames or (b) contain a proper noun such as a place-name or godname.

Gordon is an excellent and indispensable tool for students learning Old Norse. But it should be remembered that this is a basic, introductory text for first year students of Old Norse. It's most certainly not a text on Old Norse name usage or normalization.

Given the analysis above that was provided by Gunnvör, to the best of our knowledge Gordon does not follow either period transliteration standards or modern transliteration standards. Therefore, we are upholding the current policy of requiring descriptive bynames in Old Norse to be registered in lowercase. The exceptions to this policy are (1) pre-pended descriptive bynames and (2) descriptive bynames based on proper nouns.

Roster Updates

A new roster should be en closed. Please check your own entry, and if there is any error, please contact Symond and Laurel Clerk (using *our* roster entries). Also, if you have an address label file for mass-mailing the College of Arms, please check and update it *in toto*. A large number of changes, especially in July, were noted only on the roster but not on the LoAR cover letter (for which Laurel Clerk is heartily sorry).

The new CoA Ombudsman on the Board of Directors is Andre Jean Faucon (Gary Raine), [snipped]. He is added to the roster only. Our previous Ombudsman, Beth Morris (Keilyn FitzWarin), is removed from the roster.

Artemisia has completed their half do-si-do. As announced in the cover letter for the July 2002 LoAR, Tanglwyst de Holloway, formerly Sage Herald, has become Golden Wing Principal Herald, and Shauna of Carrick Point, formerly Golden Wing, is now Sage. Both ladies were and continue to be on the roster and mailing list wearing their new hats. Shauna Sage also has a new e-mail address, [snipped].

There is a new Gold Falcon Principal Herald (Calontir): Lyriel de la Foret (Debra Vigil), [snipped]. As with all principal heralds, she is on the mailing list and roster. The previous Gold Falcon, Mikhail Nikolaevich (Michael Straatman), is no longer on the mailing list or roster.

Giles Leabrook (Braddon Giles), Crux Australis Principal Herald (Lochac), has a new address: [snipped]. The roster will not list a phone number.

There is a new Green Mantle Herald (Ealdormere's internal and external submissions): Percival de la Rocque (Keith Crawley), [snipped]. The former Green Mantle, Edmund de la Haye (David E. Hayward), now Stave Herald (Ealdormere, heraldic display), is no longer on the mailing list or roster.

For Ealdormere, Erick of Longacres (David Carswell), [snipped], is added to the roster and mailing list as a herald without title (for now).

Asterisk Herald (Ansteorra's internal submissions) has changed. The new Asterisk is Medb Liath (Rhonda Hays), [snipped]. She is added to the roster only. The previous Asterisk, Cahira of Bonwicke (Traci Thompson), is removed from the roster.

The office of Rampart Herald (internal and external submissions for the Outlands) has changed. The new Rampart is Alia Marie de Blois (Lillith Lesanges), [snipped]. She is added to the roster and mailing list.

The previous Rampart Herald, Pendar the Bard (Pendar Munro), remains on the roster and mailing list as Musimon Herald (Outlands).

Anne Aliz de Bâle (Annaliese Mayette), has resigned as Fretty Herald (Outlands, commentary), so she is removed from the mailing list and roster. We have hitherto neglected to specify that the former Fretty, Kiena Munro (Ronda Munro), is also no longer on the mailing list or roster.

A new Palmer Herald (administrative and emergency replacement deputy for White Stag Principal Herald, Outlands) has taken office: Sorcha MacLeod (Tammy Ackerson), [snipped]. She is added to the roster and mailing list.

The former Palmer Herald (Outlands), Naitan de Yerdeburc (Scott Petty), will remain on the mailing list and roster as Stag's Attire Herald (Outlands).

The previous Crux Australis Herald (Lochac), Uberto Renaldi (Nigel Castle), is no longer on the roster or mailing list.
