Admin Handbook Appendix D

- A new letter is added to the suggested standard letters.
 - I, [Legal name], known in the Society as [Society name], hereby attest that I am the designated legal heir of [Legal name of decedent]'s identity in the Society and that [Legal name of decedent] died on [date]. I declare under penalty of perjury that the foregoing is true and correct.

- What is means: A copy of the death certificate (or other proof of death) and a copy of the (modern) will no longer be required for a legal heir to grant permission to conflict, to transfer armory/names, or to release armory/names when this attestation is used.

Order Name Patterns Involving Saint's Names

- Pelican reviewed the evidence used to support the order name pattern of saint's name + objection of veneration
- What it means
 - The pattern saint's name + charge for order names remains usable with any heraldic charge or an object that could plausibly be a heraldic charge
 - The word "saint" does not need to be included in order to use this pattern


Glossary of Terms Table 4 – "Proper"

- Table 4 has been significantly updated
 - Precedents defining proper for various charges have been incorporated
 - References added
 - Over 100 items reblazoned to match current definitions of proper


Rainbows Proper

- Definition changed for both natural and heraldic rainbows
 - Heraldic rainbows proper consist of three or four bands.
 - Three of those bands are gules, Or, and either vert or azure. The fourth band, if present, may be argent, vert or azure.
 - Order of the bands doesn't matter but outer bands shouldn't share a tincture with the portion of the field they are on
 - Submitter may request that the order and tincture of the bands be blazoned
 - Unless blazoned as *couped*, *throughout*, or *issuant from the sides* rainbows have clouds.
 - Presence/absence of clouds doesn't contribute to difference
 - Tincture of the clouds is a blazonable detail but doesn't contribute to difference
 - Clouds need some contrast but not good contrast with the field
 - Heraldic rainbows are considered neutral, natural rainbows are considered color


Rainbows Proper



A rainbow proper: With three bands – gules, Or, and either vert or azure. With four bands – gules, Or, and any two of vert, azure, and argent. The tincture and order doesn't contribute to difference. The order and tincture of the bands may be specified if the submitter wants.




A *natural rainbow proper*: gules, orange, Or, vert, azure, indigo, purpure (indigo is optional) or the reverse.




Rainbows have clouds (argent by default) unless blazoned as *couped* or *throughout* or *issuant from the sides*. In those cases the rainbows are cloudless by default.

Rainbows Proper


The outer bands of rainbows cannot share a tincture with the field they are on. The clouds must have some contrast with the field.



Not registrable – clouds have no contrast with the field.




Not registrable – the Or band has no contrast with Or portion of the field.



Registrable – the argent clouds have some contrast with the Or portion of the field and the azure band isn't on the azure portion of the field.

Foxes Proper

 Definition of proper updated to note that the absence of the sable socks and argent chest are unblazonable details.



A fox proper: Gules with argent tip on the tail, generally has sable socks, may have an argent chest.

Owls Proper

- Great Horned owls proper have varying shades of tan/brown with complex black markings, a cream/argent or tan/brown underside, and the characteristic large feather tufts ("horns").
 - Considered brown for conflict purposes.
 - The "horns" don't contribute to difference.
 - A brown owl proper is allowed as with all brown X proper it is primarily brown but need not be a single shade and may have artistic details in other tinctures.
- No other type of owl has a defined proper.

Falcons Proper

- A peregrine falcon proper has a brown back, a sable head, and barred brown and cream/argent underparts
 - Considered brown for conflict purposes.
- All other *falcons proper* are brown. As with all brown *proper* charged, it need not be a single shade and may have artistic details in other tinctures.

Bengal and Natural Tigers

- The terms are interchangeable and precedent disallowing Bengal tigers *proper* is overturned.
- Proper is defined as "orangish-Or marked sable".
- They will be considered a light (and conflict with Or) on a dark field or dark (and conflict with gules) on a light field. Bengal or natural tigers proper on a neutral field or on a fieldless badge must be a shade that is clearly light or dark. This will be noted in the O&A for conflict


purposes.

Some Tools/Weapons

- An axe proper has a sable blade and a brown haft. The tincture is taken from its blade so an axe proper is considered sable for conflict purposes.
 - An axe <tincture> hafted proper has a wooden (brown) handle.
- A *pickaxe proper* has a sable head and a brown haft. The tincture is taken from its head so a *pickaxe proper* is considered sable for conflict purposes.
- Proper is not defined for morningstars; however, like axes and pickaxes they take their tincture from their heads. [Conarc of Eyre, 06/2021, A-Ansteorra]
 - A morningstar argent hafted of wood proper has an argent chain and head and a wooden (brown) handle. It is considered argent for purposes of conflict.

Unusual Blazon Terms

- Naissant [Daenn Fjalornsson, 06/2021, Meridies]
 - Usage "naissant from a fess"
 - It is a period term and it means that the charge is issuant from the center of the fess rather than its edge
- Snagged [Vanished Wood, Canton of, 06/2021, Middle]
 - Used with tree stumps, the term means that the tree stump is tilted slightly so the cut top may be seen in perspective.
